



- BenefitsCheckUp® online screening tool





Senior Economic Security & Well-Being

- Half of Medicare beneficiaries have incomes at or below ~200% FPL
- 61% of senior households carry debt, with median debt = \$40,900
- Median Social Security income for women, minority older adults is less





Medicaid

- Roughly 12 million people in U.S. are eligible for both Medicaid and Medicare (sometimes called "duals")
 - As of Dec 2017, over 193,000 duals/partial duals in Washington, 60,000 more than 2008
- Medicaid pays for some Medicare copayments & cost-sharing
- States set Medicaid eligibility guidelines can be less than Federal poverty level
- Anyone who gets both Medicaid & Medicare will automatically get the Part D Low Income Subsidy/Extra Help



Medicare Savings Programs (MSPs)

- Financed by <u>Medicaid</u>; help pay <u>Medicare</u> premiums and cost-sharing for those with low income/resources
 - Three programs: QMB, SLMB, QI
 - Apply through Medicaid office
- Qualify with income up to 135% Federal poverty level
 - Several states have more generous income thresholds, but not WA
 - Several states have eliminate or increase asset threshold, but not WA
- Important notes:
 - No Medicare late enrollment penalties for those who get MSPs
 - People who qualify for QMB get Part A premium paid
 - Helpful for those who don't have work/tax history
 - Automatically get Part D Low Income Subsidy/LIS/Extra Help



Extra Help/Part D Low Income Subsidy (LIS)

- Administered by Social Security Administration and Medicare
 - Apply through Social Security
- Helps pay Medicare Part D (drug plan) costs for people with limited income/resources (income below 150% FPL)
- People pay between \$1.25 and \$8.50 for drugs at pharmacy
- Eliminates the drug coverage gap No late enrollment penalties
- CY17 225,209 LIS enrollees in WA
- FY18 12,545 applied directly to SSA; 6,266 eligible 49.90% acceptance rate

MIPPA

- Medicare Improvements for Patients and Providers Act (MIPPA) enacted by Congress in 2008
 - Funding extended through subsequent legislation through BBA 2018
 - Total annual funding = \$37.5 million (through 2020)
- Funding to State Health Insurance Assistance Programs (SHIPs), Area Agencies on Aging (AAAs)/Native American Programs, and Aging and Disability Resource Centers (ADRCs) to:
 - Help low-income Medicare beneficiaries enroll in LIS/Extra Help and MSPs
 - Assist rural residents to enroll in Part D
 - Promote Medicare's preventive services
- Tribes apply for funds to coordinate one community announcement and at least 1 community outreach event


State Opportunities to Simplify Eligibility & Enrollment

- MIPPA leads data from Social Security
 - How successful is the data in enrolling in MSP in Washington?
 - o Any referrals to SHIBA from Medicaid agency?
- Increasing income thresholds
 - States that have increased income test: CN, DC, IL, IN, ME, MS
- Eliminating or increasing asset test:
 - States that have eliminated asset test: AL, AZ, CN, DE, DC, CN, MS,NY, OR, VT
 - States that have increased asset test: ME, MN
- CMS letter to State Medicaid Directors Dec. 19, 2018

 - Chinese Information and Service Center (Seattle)








Quick Screening




- Enter zip code

- Complete full screening to better assess eligibility


Full Screening & Report



- Gather info before filling out:
 - Income & assets
 - Expenses (rent/ mortgage, taxes, health care, utilities)
 - Prescription drugs taken
- Personal report includes
 - Description of all programs
 - Website links, application forms (where available), contact info for local offices
 - Can tailor and save/print report

Resource Library





- Select state & category of program interest
- Generates a list of programs in the area
- At bottom of Resource Library page find:
 - Link to directly apply for Extra Help (application goes to Social Security)
 - SNAP Map find your state SNAP application in multiple languages, program website
